Each year ABHS celebrates the Big Week Out, a series of excursions, presentations and enrichment days. On Tuesday, 9 August Asquith Boys Years 8 and 11 set out to the ice-cold destination of Canberra. We travelled for two and a half hours until we stopped at McDonalds for breakfast. The boys sleepily had their meals and got back on the bus.

Four long but interesting hours later we arrived in Mount Ainslie where we could see all of glorious Canberra. The next stop was the Australian Institute of Sport (AIS). There we got to meet some Australians in training and discover how Australia's top athletes train and live everyday.

After the AIS the boys were very keen to set off to the next destination; Berridale where they discovered their cabins and settled into their accommodation. The boys got the choice of a 4, 6 or an 8 room cabin. After an hour or so the boys went down to the ski hire reception to order their skis, poles, boots and parka. Shortly after the ski hire, dinner was served and the boys went back to their cabins to relax and then go to bed.

That night the boys had a karaoke night where everybody had a go at their favourite songs in their cabin groups. The next day was much the same except some of the boys were really having a go at the slopes and some even discovered new trails. At lunch we had the same meal of sausage rolls, meat pies or salad rolls. Getting back out on the slopes the sun came out and the boys had a much warmer ski

BIG WEEK OUT - YEAR 7

52 SUBURBS EXHIBITION & PHOTO SHOOT OF THE ROCKS

Someone from above smiled down upon us for the BWO. The weather forecast for both the Monday and the Tuesday predicted showers and rain. I awoke on the Monday morning to a glorious day, perfect for photographing our beautiful city. Cameras, worksheets and rolls at the ready, I was ready to embark. Never fear, Cooke is here! I didn't forget the rest of the staff and Year 7. The boys were excited.

We arrived in the city and split into our two groups. Ms Mashman and myself wandered the city streets, with our boys in tow, up to the Museum of Sydney - "MOS" for those in the know! "MOS" is situated on the site of the original Government House. Arthur Phillip could have looked down upon his minions from the top of the hill, "lording" it over the land. The forecourt of the museum shows the patterning of the original foundations. The boys were also given another perspective, that of the Indigenous people. They were shown the instillation art work, Edge of the Trees by artists Fiona Foley and Janet Laurence. The work evokes the "cultural and physical" history of the site. The boys were fascinated by the interactive nature of the work. They were able to







walk through the work and experience the textures and sounds. The next work was by artist, Gordon Bennett. He is a contemporary Indigenous artist. His artwork, Possession Island, elicited amazing responses from the boys. They recognised dot painting, the appropriation of another work and action painting (Pollock). Michael Bennett was even able to articulate how Pollock developed action painting. Both the guide and myself were exceptionally impressed! We then visited the Gordon Syron artwork, Invasion 1. Again the boys were able to provide incredible responses that showed their understanding and empathy of the events depicted in the painting.



We finally made our way to the 52 Suburbs Exhibition. The boys absorbed the images and were very busy answering the questions to their work sheet in preparation of their report. Their understanding of Louise Hawson's work was evident on their Visual Arts artmaking enrichment day the following



Thursday. They were able to transform their own images of The Rocks into brilliant diptychs. On our way to The Rocks we had a quick stop at McDonalds. The boys had been perfectly behaved as well as fantastic learners. It was only right that they be rewarded. During our quick lunch break the boys learnt of the audacity of the local seagulls. We quarded our lunch!



Our journey through The Rocks took us to the end of George Street, down under the Harbour Bridge and along the foreshore of Sydney Harbour. The following day we took a different route; up Argyle Cut past the Garrison Church and back down George Street again. We were able to document the architecture, streetscapes and people. Ms Mashman and I were delighted to show the boys a variety of interesting places to photograph and to teach the boys how to view and compose their photographs.

Thursday's Art Enrichment Day saw the boys creating their diptychs using Photoshop. They were also all involved in a collaborative artwork. Each of the boys was provided with a section of a photograph and a

piece of card. They were instructed on a variety of painting and drawing techniques. The sections will be joined together to create one image. It should be interesting to see what happens with that. Keep an eye open for it at the artshow.

All in all we had a fabulous couple of days. It goes without saying; I finished each day with a cup of tea with my feet up on my recliner! **Ms Cooke, Visual Arts**

BIG WEEK OUT - YEAR 9

WOLLONGONG STEELWORKS EXCURSION

92 Year 9 students were treated to a fantastic day out to visit the **Port Kembla Steelworks** and **Wollongong Science Centre.** The day started with a very cold morning but had warmed up by the time we had morning tea at Stuart Park at the beachside at Wollongong. After morning tea one group headed to BlueScope Steel at Port Kembla for a 2 hour tour where the boys donned their safety gear and headed to the main smelter for a chance to see hot (and I mean very, very hot) slabs of steel being poured and cut to size before being sent to the rollers to be made into sheet metal. The boys witnessed the steel being rolled to various thicknesses and packaged up to be sent to customers.



The second group spent some time in the Science Centre run by the University of Wollongong. The boys watched a star show in the planetarium followed by some hands on activities including a radar gun to measure the speed of a baseball throw, a bicycle that produces electricity and a strength machine where the students couldn't quite match the teachers. The visit culminated with a Liquid Nitrogen show which was very cool! (literally).

The excursion was long with quite a bit of travelling but the behaviour of the boys was excellent and on behalf of the Science Staff I would like to congratulate all the students on their positive conduct.

GREAT NORTH WALK

On Friday of the Big Week Out, 70 boys set out on the Great North Walk between Hornsby and Thornleigh. The walk was run by Sport and Recreation TAFE students and we split into 4 groups with 3 trainees per group. The walk was about 10 km long



After a huge week of activities CAPA (Creative and Performing Arts) teachers finished off with a day of enrichment for their elective classes. While the rest of the year went walking on the Great North Walk, CAPA students were exposed to forms of enlightenment that only Asquith artisans can provide!

ELECTIVE MUSIC

Year 9 Elective Music travelled into the city to the Australian Institute of Music otherwise known as AIM. We were given a tour of the facilities and studios. The institute provided the students with some background information about the types of courses that are available to them after they leave school.

The boys were impressed with the performance course and also the audio engineering course. Students have attended several of their productions in 2011; Best of Aussie Rock and the Woodstock Experience. These shows have enlightened the boys as to some of the music options that are available. They were very excited to experience a behind the scenes tour.

After our AIM tour was finished we made our way to IMAX where we saw Antarctica. The 3D film provided, not only, magnificent vistas but a music score that reached crescendos that complemented the scenery. The music was written by an Australian composer which is core topic for stage 5 Music. As always one of the highlights was a visit to McDonalds on the way home.

ELECTIVE DRAMA

During the Big Week Out, a group of Year 9 Drama boys attended a workshop at the National Institute of Dramatic Arts (NIDA) with Ms Mashman. They were given a tour of the facilities, including performance spaces and the four theatres.

The day started off with a two hour improvisation workshop, in which all students eagerly participated. They learned new ways to develop a scene and make a character more engaging and interesting to an audience. Improvisation games included space jump, show us ya face, how do you walk, the guard and the thief, status hats and alien egg. These improvisation games taught the boys how to accept and extend offers made in a performance. They took the opportunity to extend and excel at the games and proved to be quite the entertainment.

As always one of the highlights was a visit to McDonalds during their lunch break. The boys enjoyed a day out in the city showcasing their dramatic talents.

ELECTIVE PDM

Students in PDM (Photography Digital Media) are currently experiencing the photographic joys that the suburb of Asquith has to offer. Year 9 students were given the opportunity to wander the streets of Asquith and document the environment with their camera. Students examined the suburb through new eyes with Ms Cooke providing

We passed the famous "ABC", marvelling at the architecture, greens and ramshackle buildings at the rear. The group moved on through Storey Park and met up with a group of local council workers. They were more than happy to be photographed. This was followed with a stroll down Old Berowra Road where we met an elderly gentleman in a motorised wheel chair.

We continued to explore and made our way to the

The boys plucked up the guts and asked the lovely lady at the dance shop if they could take her photo and she was more than happy to join the documentary. It turned out that the boys knew her! After a quick trip to Coles (and a few more pics) we headed back to school. The afternoon session was spent loading and editing images. Our intention is to pick the best for a book called The Asquithians: A Documentary of the Community. All in all we had a fabulous time not only learning about photography but developing good relationships with one another.

ELECTIVE VISUAL ARTS

At the end of 2010, Hornsby Council provided Ms Holder with three poles that were erected at the edge of the Old Pacific Hwy car park.

People have walked past these poles and wondered about them all year.

Year 9 Visual Arts students painted each of the poles a different colour and started to work on designs. The designs were based on Australian flora and fauna that reflect the local environment. They then started to draft the designs onto the poles.

On the day, the weather looked a little unpredictable. This would not deter Ms Holder. Her family contacts meant that she was able to provide the top of the range tarpaulin over the site. The boys were exceptionally impressed, especially since she also knew how to construct the thing! Out came the paints and the brushes. Painting began. The boys have represented owls, frogs and Rainbow Lorikeets. Integrated in the work are words that form the patterned background.

The works are due to be judged by an indigenous member of the community and will also be sealed to preserve the work for generations of Asquith Boys to come.



MATHS

About the Education Tax Refund

Who is eligible?

- A person who has received Family Tax Benefit (FTB) Part A for a child undertaking primary or secondary school studies.
- Independent students in primary or secondary school.
- People on other allowances may be eligible too.

How much can be claimed?

Those eligible can claim 50% of eligible education expenses up to the maximum amounts.

For the 2010-11 financial year the maximum amounts that can be claimed are:

- \$794 for each primary school child that is, a refund of up to \$397, and
- \$1,588 for each secondary school child that is a refund of up to \$794.

What can be claimed in 2010-11?

Eligible expenses include the cost of buying, establishing, repairing and maintaining any of the following items:

- · home computers and laptops
- computer-related equipment such as printers, USB flash drives, and disability aids to assist in the use of computer equipment for students with special needs
- · computer repairs
- · home internet connections
- · computer software for educational use
- school textbooks and other printed learning material, including prescribed textbooks, associated learning materials, study guides and stationery, and
- · prescribed trade too's for secondary school trade courses.

How do people claim?

- · The ETR is claimed in an individual's tax return, or
- For those who don't lodge a tax return, it is claimed on the Education Tax Refund for individuals claim form, available from the Tax Office.

School uniforms

The Government is changing the Education Tax Refund (ETR) so that people can claim their kid's school uniforms. This means people will be able to claim school-approved uniform items from 1 July 2012.

What do I need to do and when?

Computer Repairs

From 1 July 2011 start keeping receipts for school uniform items so you can claim them next year.

What school uniform items will I be eligible to claim?

Items need to be distinctive and recognised by the school - but are not limited to items bearing a school crest. For example:

- 1. A public school has a policy which states that students should wear yellow shirts, blue hats, grey shorts or skirts and black leather shoes to identify the students as attending the school. However, while wearing these colours is strongly encouraged, it is not compulsory. An eligible individual whose child attends the school buys items which fit within this policy from a store unaffiliated with the school. None of the clothing items contain the name of the school or school crest. As the items, including shoes, are approved or recognised as part of a distinctive school outfit and fall under the policy, they would be eligible expenses. This applies irrespective of where the clothing was purchased or the fact the uniform was not mandatory.
- 2. A school has a dress code where students are required to be dressed in a neat and presentable fashion, but which does not indicate a more specific colour or style that the clothing should take. An eligible individual whose child attends the school buys clothes which they intend to wear to school. The items would not be eligible expenses. While the clothing meets the school's dress code, they lack the sufficiently distinctive quality of a uniform, and could not identify the child as a student at the school.

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


