PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

Chaplain/Student Welfare Worker

You may be aware that the federal government has made a change to the School Chaplaincy Program. School communities can now opt for either a **Chaplain** or qualified **Student Welfare Worker** from the local community to work with school staff and support our welfare programs. The Student Welfare Worker would be a secular appointment. This issue has been discussed at ABHS School Council and P and C meetings recently. I invite input from parents on this important issue. Change in Year 10 arrangements post School Certificate exams

I sent a letter to all Year 10 parents recently, explaining the DEC's change in policy regarding the post School Certificate exam arrangements this year. Year 10 students' last school day of 2011 will be the same as all other Years, Friday, December 16. Students who are leaving school to pre-arranged employment/training/apprenticeships and do not intend to return to school in Year 11 may leave after the School Certificate Assembly on December 9 if they can provide me with details of their destination, and have carried out clearance obligations at school. Any other parents who wish that their son leave school before these dates must apply to me for a school exemption.

TAS - FOOD TECH & HOSPITALITY







TAS ENGINEERING STUDIES

Engineering (Stage 5) has been introduced this year to Year 9 students and so far it has proved a popular addition to the TAS faculty subject area. While Engineering Studies has been available to Stage 6 (Year 11 and 12 students) for many years this is a first for Asquith Boys. Traditionally the boys have selected Industrial Technology subjects – Wood and Metal which have been usual choices.

This year we have run a full class of Engineering where the students learn basic engineering

principles and apply them to practical projects.



They started Term 1 learning about structural design, building and testing a water tower (using buckets of water) until failure. They calculated the total load carried as well as the load to weight ratio of the towers to see who had built the strongest structure.



In Semester 2 they are designing and building a jib crane and incorporating a pulley system to lift a maximum load.

It is a subject that caters for students who would like to try something different and a little more challenging and it seems there are quite a few as we are running two classes next year: one being a composite class for Year 9 and 10 students. Hopefully some of these boys will continue into the senior subject area where they can really get the feel for what engineering is all about.








INAUGURAL ENVIRONMENTAL PHOTOGRAPHY COMPETITION 2011





This was a project organised by Hornsby Council with an environmental focus. Three totem poles were installed on-site to be painted and designs were created in 2010. Due to the continuous rainy weather and life's journey, serious painting work on the project was not achieved until July 2011. In fact every time Ms Holder organised the elect group of

year 8, 9 and 10 students to paint or even draw up the totems, black clouds rolled in and the heavens opened within the hour! (perhaps this project should be implemented every time there are droughts!!)

In an attempt to resolve the project the Year 9 Visual Arts Big Week Out Enrichment Day 2011 was planned and a small but dedicated group of students were involved in painting.

From the Head Teacher:

This is the first edition of what I hope to be a twice a term newsletter to keep you in touch with what is happening in your son's stage band.

In here we will be providing stories and information about what is happening in rehearsals and upcoming events. We will also include tips and advice about instrument care and servicing, tutoring and practice.

This will also be a place to share the many photographs of your boys that are taken at every performance opportunity within and outside of school.

I am hoping this will provide the missing link in communication terms that we have searched for since 2008.

The newsletter will be published in digital form and emailed as well as included in the school newsletter.

Stage Band Tips-Practice

This term in light of our need to improve the standard of what we do so that we can compete on the public stage in competitions, we are stressing the importance of effective instrument practice.



Practice should occur at least 4 times per week but would

In a practice session, on any instrument, players need to practice drills, warm-ups and scales and then they need to practice their pieces, with particular focus on areas of need outlined during band practice. Pieces that are being performed in Stage Band should then each be rehearsed and then it is important that the boys be developing pieces that they are interested in on their instrument separate from the band.

If we all make an effort to improve as individuals we will be a better hand. We can all make our rehearsals more worthwhile if we do this and work together more effectively as a team. This will set us up to be able to compete.

2011—The year so far

We started this year with big plans, an excellent meeting with a full common room and LOTS of you volunteering support and assistance.

We made the decision with the advice and support of many of you who have been with the Stage Band for some time, to make the Charity Concert a biennial event to occur every two years. This is so that we will hopefully be able to interest our audiences more effectively. As a result plans were made to involve the Stage Band in other events in the greater community such as eisteddfods and festivals. lain and the boys began their rehearsal schedule and worked solidly to bring the band to a standard suitable to be able to compete on the public stage.

Thankfully the everwonderful Mrs Catherine Pedersen supported the band with organizational back up and entry forms for the events.

lain obtained the challenging pieces required of the band for the eisteddfods and the band practiced in rehearsals in preparation. Unfortunately, however, lain had to make the difficult decision that, although they had practiced at school, the boys were not at a standard as a group that would allow them to perform in a com-

petitive manner to judges and pulled the entries.

We had also planned to participate in Adelaide and Manly Jazz Festivals. Adelaide was beyond us this year in terms of fundraising and the organization necessary but we were booked and ready to play at Manly Jazz which is timed to occur at a difficult time during the school holidays. Unfortunately many key players were going to be away or unavailable on the day so again, disappointingly, we were unable to perform. At our stage band meeting for 2012 we plan to discuss and seek your advice and support in trying to solve these ongoing issues.



THE WORD FROM ENGLISH

Students of the Month:

Well done to Morgan Morris, James Somerville and Will Van Egmond-Jones of Year 9 for excellent essays on Steven Herrick's use of imagery in his poetic novels. Year 8 have written letters to Mr Collins about the merits of the novels they read last term. It's amazing how having such an audience has made the boys take the task very seriously. I'm sure that Mr Collins will enjoy reading and marking these.

What's Happening Around the Classes:

Year 7: Congratulations to all the Year 7 boys for writing their first analytical essay on the Mythology of Dragons as portrayed in film. This term they will be getting their poetic juices flowing by creating their own anthology and infusing their writing with figurative flair. Enjoy!

Year 8: Students will be involved in an exciting new unit on Picture Books. In this unit we will be targeting specific NAPLAN literacy skills that have been identified as weaknesses. This unit will be closely monitored as students will be developing their ability to engage audiences in their extended writing and refine their sentence structure. Students are looking forward to seeing their skills improve.

Year 9 are now quoting Shakespeare regularly; as they *knit their brows* when they realise that they are *having too much of a good thing* and *laughing themselves into stitches,* understanding that it is a *foregone conclusion,* that Shakespeare is, *if the truth be known, without rhyme or reason,* more than *fair play!* This term they will be studying the enduring relevance of *Romeo and Juliet.* This play will prove very relevant to the experiences of teenage boys.

Year 10: All students should be hard at work preparing their skills for their final School Certificate Examination. This will commence in week 5. These skills are also valuable for the Senior school.

Year 11: Students have now begun their Year 12 Course, with both Advanced and Standard courses starting with the Area of Study, 'Belonging'. The Area of Study composes 30% of the English Course involving responses to stimulus, creative writing and essay writing on a number of texts. Students need to develop a deep conceptual understanding of this topic. We encourage them to discuss and explore ideas about belonging within all media and even in

reflection with you, their parents. There will be two assessments this term, a creative piece and an essay worth 20% of their overall mark.

Year 12: Students were very pleased with Paper 1 and 2 of the HSC. The questions were accessible and many of the conversations we had with students after the exam were very positive. Good luck with the rest of the HSC, the English staff wishes you all the best!

SCIENCE HSC Science

A reminder that these students **must** change their enrolments with Ms Laffer, so they are sitting the correct exam next year.

Year 10

The School Certificate is starting in Week 5 and Science is one of the 3 core subjects. The work examined in the School Certificate covers everything done in Year 9 and 10. Practice multiple choice questions can be found on the Board of Studies website as well as past School Certificate papers. The students will be doing revision in class but extra study is recommended for students to achieve their best.

Year 8

The annual ESSA Science assessment will be conducted online this year. Students will complete a practice test in the next few weeks to ready themselves for the proper test that will be held on 22nd November. The results will be sent to parents as well as being used by the school to focus on areas of need for the boys of ABHS.

Yearly Exams

All students in Year 7, 8 and 9 need to be working solidly up to the end of the year as Yearly Exams will be held in week 9.

Results from the exams will be used to determine what Science classes the boys will be going into next year.

All boys should have a textbook at home from which they can study, as well as their class notes.

Hi from HSIE!

As we are a very large Faculty, I thought it would be an opportune time to outline to you the thoughts and processes that are proceeding towards the National Curriculum in our areas.

As you are aware, the School Certificate Examination in Year 10 has now been removed and the official school leaving age has increased to 17 years. To us in Humanities, this is an ideal time to develop meaningful and appropriate courses for our boys so that we can offer the best education in terms of knowledge, skills and attitudes. At present, we are only at the plenary level of discussion – clearly due to the fact that the Department of Education and Communities (DEC) and the Board of Studies have not released their Directions for the Future.

We feel that an exciting time is ahead, where scope for planning and delivering courses that are geared towards developing students' knowledge and meaningful experiences – our top priority – is available to us. The year ahead promises to be a very exciting time.

Senior Classes:

At present all students are gearing up for final tests and examinations.

Mr Laing's Geography class are studying Ecosystems – Coastal Dunes and the Great Barrier Reef. A Field Study is being planned to Long Reef for either this Semester or early next year.

Miss Foster's Modern History class has begun looking at the Period of World War 1. This is the compulsory part of the course and the boys have responded solidly to the set work.

Miss Byrnes' Legal Studies have started the topic of Crime and will be visiting the District and Supreme Criminal Courts in early November to view the Criminal Trial Process. Year 12 Economics have started the Global Economy Topic.

Miss Woolley's Year 12 Business Studies have started in earnest – Operations is the first Topic in both classes and this should absorb most of the term's work.

The Year 12 HSC Paper has been sat and the boys responded confidently to the Paper.

My classes have also started the HSC Year with interest. Our first Topic - Cities of Vesuvius, Pompeii and Herculaneum – has been looking at the sources and geography of the area and the boys have already completed the first two chapters. We will be going to special Lectures in the city in late November to consolidate the topic. Two boys have opted to do the History Extension Course and this is something I feel will benefit both of these excellent and enthusiastic students. Our 2011 student, Matthew Buwalda, completed an investigation of Gallipoli - A Defining Moment for Australia and Contempt for Britain - looking at Campaign The Gallipoli from a different perspective.

Junior Classes:

Year 10 are concluding a defining moment in both their and the NSW system's history – the final School Certificate Year and Examination. Good luck in their examinations.

Our Years 7, 8 and 9/10 are all working on their History, Geography, Commerce and Elective subjects with examinations and class tests the priority. Some excellent models have been handed in recently.

Student of the Month in the Senior School – Sam Gibbons for his results and efforts in all areas – Business Studies, Legal Studies, Modern History. He has also opted to do History Extension. Well done, Sam.

Student of the Month in the Middle School – Michael Fuary for his excellent results in Year 10 History and Geography.

Student of the Month in the Junior School – Ben Gibson (8E) for consistent and excellent attitude to all work in HSIE. Ben has also been invited to tour Turkey in 2012.

Well done to all boys and thanks to all teachers for their hard work.

Year 6 to Year 7 transition program:

We looked at how Mathematics is taught in primary classes in comparison to high school. We discussed how Asquith Boys could assist the primary teachers in preparing their students for high school. As a result of the meeting, over the coming weeks the Maths staff will visit Year 6 classes and conduct one lesson as it would be taught in high school. The primary teacher will then conduct three similar lessons in Mathematics. Early next year we will evaluate the program to measure its effectiveness with the hope that it will become a permanent link of support between us and our local primary schools.

Examinations

The big exams for this term of course are the HSC exam and the School Certificate. This year we have three capable Extension 2 candidates and are hoping for excellent results in that course. There are also a number of students in the other courses who have been working towards some strong results. Year 10 students will be starting their revision program in preparation for their exams. We are looking forward to some of the best results achieved in the School Certificate in the school's recent history as we have a number of highly capable Mathematics students.

Other year groups will also be facing end of year tests in the next few weeks. It is very important that all students begin to revise now so that they are well prepared and can show the skills they have developed over the semester.

We wish all students every success in the exam period.

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

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
