
































FOOD TECHNOLOGY TERM 3

TEAPOTS, THE BIENNALE & COCKATOO ISLANDCAPA Excursions term 3 2012

Term 3 has been an exciting one in that students from Year 7, 11, 9 and 10 have all had opportunities to move beyond the classroom walls for more direct learning experiences.

We have explored the notion of the exhibition on a small and huge scale, in a small collective run gallery for a local competition to a major world event, the Sydney Biennale 2012, staged in traditional galleries the AGNSW and MCA as well as historical sites

Years 9 and 10 Ceramics students attended a fun excursion to the **Sydney Teapot Show** at the Innercity Clayworkers Gallery in Glebe on Thursday 9 August with Ms Holder and Ms Tapner. We travelled by train and then bus to the bohemian centre of Glebe to the Innercity Clayworkers Gallery. This tiny space hosts an annual show and competition where potters from around the country create works to suit particular criteria and categories and sponsors award prizes to winners. The teapots exhibited ranged from the whimsical, to wonderful and weird. Some were inspired by the theme of Australiana, others by writer Charles Dickens, producing some very interesting and wild teapots. The boys were fascinated by the opportunity to see the close workings of an art competition as well as the gallery itself. This day provided an enormous inspiration to all of us in our own designing process as well as in understanding galleries. The boys also introduced a new ball game which involves propelling the ball from many viewpoints and positions on the ground!

Year 11 Visual Arts students went on a mystery tour of contemporary art with Ms Holder on Thursday 23 August. We explored the **2012 Sydney Biennale** at both the AGNSW in the Domain and the MCA at Circular Quay. We were treated to a discussion tour of the AGNSW Biennale exhibits, which started us thinking about the works on show and their connection to the theme "All Our Relations". Following this and a swift lunch and brisk walk to Circular Quay, we explored the Biennale over the two floors at the MCA. At these galleries we observed the exhibition of contemporary, postmodern and topical artworks from artists gathered from around the world. There were five particular works of interest which employed technology which the boys studied in relation to their final artmaking and artwriting unit in Year 11, relating to film, photography and landscape.

The final outing in the Creative Arts Department's "get into art outside the classroom" program for Term 3 was the trip to **Cockatoo Island** and the 2012 Sydney Biennale for all of Year 7 on Friday 7 September. Ms Cooke, Ms Holder, Mr Williamson, Mr Fisher, Ms Tapner and Mr Buckley travelled by Transdev bus to Circular Quay first thing, ready to catch the ferry across the Harbour. Nothing could have prepared us for the surprise which met us on the Quay...every boys' dream and every teachers' nightmare...FREE CHIPS BY THE PALETTE! The boys were showered in them from multi directions and Ms Cooke likened the sight to seagulls squawking for hot chips.



Our next challenge was to get on a ferry. In spite of all the planning in the world, nothing prepared Sydney Ferries for the volume of passengers and as a result the wait for the ferry was long. We were rewarded however, by the efforts of the ferry company who put on a special service so that we could delay our return. Cockatoo Island was exciting and inspiring. Year 7 split into 4 groups who explored different parts of the Biennale exhibition on the island in a howling gale. The boys were fascinated by the many and varied artworks made from materials not usually associated with artmaking.

We survived gale force winds and had a day that inspired a new interest in art for all of year 7!



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
