

PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE


NAPLAN Analysis

We have now had a chance to analyse 2013 NAPLAN results for Years 7 and 9. I am pleased to report that this year's Year 9 cohort has registered very significant improvement on their 2011 Year 7 results. This is now happening every year, as our long-term whole school learning programs are proving very effective in boosting students' results in literacy and numeracy.

This is especially true when ABHS students are compared to the progress of boys across all schools in NSW (public and private). Our overall mean score gain across all five NAPLAN categories was 44.2 marks as against 39.3 marks gained for all boys in NSW.

This means that students at ABHS are consistently doing 13.5% better than boys at all other schools. This has happened now for the last three years. This is clear evidence that boys at ABHS have a distinct advantage over boys in other schools.

The table (on the left) shows the results of this year's Year 9 compared to boys across NSW.



Grounds Project

Head Teacher TAS, Mr Craig Philip, has initiated a plan to upgrade the old basketball court area that is near the Pacific Highway entrance to the school. The plan involves the removal of the court surface and the brick wall, some landscaping, and the creation of an outdoor learning space. This will make the area much more attractive and we will be able to utilise a new learning area. The P&C have agreed to contribute towards some funding for the project. We have also emailed parents asking for any technical or financial assistance to the project. The first step is the removal of the old wall, which has been re-painted by Asquith Boys over the years. Old Boys have been contacted for a "memory wall" morning tea at 8:30am on Friday 15th November. Photos will be taken and we will have a permanent reminder of the wall in a prominent area of the school.

High School Experience Day

On Thursday 7th November we staged the annual High School Experience Day. About 150 Year 5 boys from 18 local primary schools spent a full day at ABHS experiencing a range of lessons. Year 10 prefects accompanied groups of 20 boys all day. Feedback we have received from student and parent evaluation sheets has been extraordinarily positive, and it is clear that our visitors immensely enjoyed their day at ABHS. My thanks to the primary schools for their co-operation, our staff who taught lessons, and the main organisers, Mr George Moscos and Mrs Inez Beckerleg. *(A detailed report & photos will accompany the next Backchat)*

Year 10

Year 10 students will be having exams in Week 8 this term, which will contribute to their grades for the Record of School Achievement (RoSA), that has replaced the old School Certificate. I have written to all Year 10 parents with an explanation about the RoSA and end of year activities. I would like everybody to understand, however, that the RoSA is only issued to students by the NSW Board of Studies when students finally leave school (for most students at the end of Year 12) and only if they have met course outcomes in the mandatory subjects.

TEXTILES



Well Done Boys!



'What's your poison?'

That phrase above pretty much sums up for what I have learnt about the sustenance that some people fondly imbibe in the darkest, full-blooded hours of the night. The drink that is morphed into several different versions of itself-beer (which can range from low to mid), wines, spirits and pre-mixed spirits-offers the vast majority of adults relaxation and as a means of social entertainment. For others, it is drink that turns into the drug they misuse to extreme levels. The RSA course that I attended on the 3rd of July, 2013, illustrated that fact.



On the day of the course, the speaker with a remote in his hand and a slide show behind him spit-fired questions that tested our concept of the alcohol issues in today's society. Did you know that it is estimated that 3200 people die as a result of excessive alcohol? I sure didn't. After that, other students and I who attended the one-day class were instantly pulled into the intricacies of the required steps of identifying, selling and monitoring the alcohol to various people. The speaker also illustrated ways on identifying the level of toxicity in people. If a person has a debate against an inanimate object and loses, it's best to say that person needs to be "cut off". Other indications were if people stumble or they slur their words.

In other topics, the speaker would illustrate the problems with alcohol abuse. He used slides that depicted newspaper clippings of a variety of deaths caused by the over-consumption of alcohol. This was reinforced with a visit from a police-transitional officer who had videos that depicted fights that ended quite badly on both sides. It was a deeply concerning topic that I found quite shocking because we, as a young generation, have left this unaddressed. For these deaths to happen, because of the abuse of alcohol is senseless and wrong.

As part of the course, three representatives of a youth organisation entered into our class to talk about the problems with alcohol abuse and addiction. Combined with that, they discussed ways with us on how to combat these in schools and on the outside world. In one part of their discussion, they showed us a weird-looking device called 'beer goggles'. They were supposed to give us the impression of the effects of being drunk. The representatives asked for a volunteer to wear a goggle that was altered to 0.05 on the BAC scale and another volunteer to wear another goggle that had 0.02 on the BAC scale. It was quite interesting and hilarious to see the different movements of the volunteers as they tried to move in one single line.

At the end of the course, I felt I was truly informed on the effects of alcohol on society and on people. It was an amazing experience and I would recommend the class to anyone who wants to get into the hospitality business. I would also recommend the class to mainly everyone. It is important to know what you are drinking, especially how much you are drinking.

We now have a lemon, mandarin, peach, mulberry and olive tree. Students in horticulture also checked the health of the native plant regeneration areas planted in previous years.



MATHS

Year 6 to Year 7 transition program:



At the end of last term the Maths staff from Asquith Boys High met up with Year 6 teachers from our local primary schools. The aim of the meeting was to share ideas in improving student outcomes in Year 7 by reducing the stress of transition from primary to high school Mathematics. We looked at how Mathematics is taught in primary classes in comparison to high school. We discussed how Asquith Boys could assist the primary teachers in preparing their students for high school. As a result of the meeting, over the coming weeks the Maths staff will visit Year 6 classes and conduct one lesson as it would be taught in high school. The primary teacher will then conduct three similar lessons in Mathematics. Early next year we will evaluate the program to measure its effectiveness with the hope that it will become a permanent link of support between us and our local primary schools.

Examinations

The big exams for this term of course are the HSC exams. This year we have very capable candidates and are hoping for excellent results in

all courses. Year 10 students will be starting their program in preparation for their selected HSC course. Other year groups will also be facing end of year tests in the next few weeks. It is very important that all students begin to revise now so that they are well prepared and can show the skills they have developed over the semester. We wish all students every success in the exam period.
