

DEPUTY PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Term 3 is progressing well at Asquith Boys High School, with students and staff busily occupied in many curricular and extra-curricular activities. Most notably, Year 12 students have recently completed their Trial HSC examinations and are now in the process of analysing results, taking feedback from staff and setting down rigorous study plans for the external HSC examinations. I would advise all Year 12 students to make the most of every moment they have during class and private study time in order to maximise their final results.

Years 7 & 8 recently undertook rail safety workshops convened by Transport NSW. These were conducted on a rotational basis in class groups over two days in late July. With such a high proportion of our students catching trains every day, it is essential that they are provided with opportunities such as these. Students reported that the workshops were informative and presented in an interesting format.

I would like to emphasise that the only allowable passage to Asquith Station for students in the afternoon is via the dedicated pedestrian crossing on Peats Ferry Rd and then walking on the designated footpath, using the two other pedestrian crossings closer to the station. It is strictly forbidden for students to use the Jersey St school exit or cross the main roads in any way other than using the dedicated crossings. Consequences will be enforced for breaches of this.

This term the weather to will get warmer, however many students will still choose to wear jumpers to school until later in the year. I would like to remind students and parents that non-uniform jumpers or hoodies are not acceptable; either as a top layer or worn under school clothing. Students will receive a uniform pass if non uniform items are obvious or visible to staff. If, on a rare occasion, a student must wear a non-uniform item, a note must be provided by a parent/caregiver.


SAS Staff Recognition Week 2016 29 August – 2 September 2016 "SAS Staff Essential"

All of the boys were excellent participants on the day and overall Asquith Boys finished 2nd at the carnival, which is the best result for Asquith in many many years!

There were a few standout performances at this carnival with 22 first place results and several others coming 2nd and 3rd in their respective events.





THE PASSING OF AUSTEN JAMES HUGHES, OAM PRINCIPAL OF ASQUITH BOYS 1976 – 1985



Austen was loved by students and staff in his role at Asquith Boys. His Principalship coincided with a period in the School's history when the student population was at its greatest, not withstanding that during those years, less than 50% of students completed their HSC. With a population of above 1,100 students two demountable classrooms were installed to cope with demand. Managing the large number of students was one of Austen's challenges at ABHS.

Austen's love for students at that time was remarkable whom he referred to as 'my boys'. Likewise his love of cricket was widely recognized. During his entire time at Asquith Boys he held the position of President of the Northern District Cricket Club, until 2002. Two years prior to his retirement from teaching and Asquith Boys, he was elected a Life Member of the Northern District Cricket Club. In 1984 Austen's service was recognised with Life Membership of the NSW Cricket Association.

Reflections from Staff & 'Old Boys'

I remember Austen with great fondness. He was the Principal when I arrived at Asquith Boys High in 1984. Austen was a real "people" person. I remember his easy going manner and the way he trusted his staff to do their jobs efficiently and effectively. He loved sports of all kinds, but Cricket was his passion. When he retired, it was a sad day at Asquith Boys, and the next Principal had a big task to fill the void left by Austen.

'I will always remember Austen as the best boss I ever worked with'. Brian Brook, ABHS HT Maths during the time of Austen Hughes.

I know this will sound weird and possibly not believed, however it was only **yesterday** coming up the lift at work from getting a cup of coffee, that Austen came to mind. I was reflecting how much he supported the First XIV Rugby and what a down to earth knock about, yet debonair guy he was. For some reason I remembered his green Toyota semi-sports car.

I then thought to myself, given how old I am (56 years) that Austen was probably long gone to another place as would many of my teachers, particularly from primary school.

Ross Lamb (School Vice Captain 1977)

I remember Austen going out to see as many games as possible on Sports day. He was a great Principal of the 'old school' buying the best equipment especially for sport. He was wise and caring of his staff and students too.

Mrs Laine Saunders (Mrs. Jim) Special Ed teacher at ABHS from late 60s till late 70s. Laine was late Jim Saunders (music teacher's) wife.

The vale for Austen Hughes made me reflect on ABHS times and I thought I would pen a memory. Mr Hughes' first year as Principal in 1976 coincided with my last year as a student. At the end of the year, just before we broke up for HSC exams, I was summoned to the Principal's office. I went in trepidation, trying to think what had I done to warrant this meeting. To my surprise Austen asked me what my plans were after school, to which I replied that I planned to have a few months doing nothing much before I hoped to go to university. To my surprise he then offered me a job as the School Groundsman, full time for 6 weeks at the then princely sum of about \$300 a week. Before I could think I said yes, and so after exams I started as a casual employee,



tending gardens and lawns. The main job was riding a tractor to mow the sports oval. I had never driven a tractor before and learned quickly. On wet days I was expected to work indoors, mending broken furniture, but it was summertime and I was always outdoors.

Working around the school and in the sheds, I had many curious looks from younger boys who thought they recognised me. I needed to buy fuel and parts for lawnmowers and the tractor, and asked Austen how should I organise this. He said that I could go to certain local suppliers where the school had accounts and that I could use his car to do this! It was a great feeling driving his Nissan sports car around Asquith/Hornsby several times to buy supplies, and watch boys incredulous looks as I left and returned to the school in the Principal's car and using his car space!

I am very grateful for the opportunity Austen gave me for an 'after school' job, and the trust he placed in me (and for the anonymous teacher who gave him my name). My memories of Austen in 1976 were good ones, as he led the school and gave privileges to Year 12 students (which we felt were duly earned).

Teachers have been working hard on developing new programs and teaching resources for the new syllabus. Geography provides a chance to develop research and reading skills to assist students with their future career paths. Most **Junior Geography** classes have been working on the skills components of their Geography courses, and will be issued with their respective home research assignments in the coming weeks.

The HSIE Ancient and Modern History Trip is going ahead and the fantastic aspect of this is that 17 boys are going to share in an unforgettable experience. We are hoping that this will be a bi-annual event and that Asquith Boys can begin a new tradition.

Important information for Year 12 students

All Year 12 students have been issued with their copy of the UAC Guide 2016- 2017. This guide includes detailed course descriptions as well as general information on admission requirements, choosing courses, applying, offers and enrolment, course costs and financial assistance and the ATAR. This information is also available on UAC's website at www.edu.au. Students will need their UAC pin number (mailed to them in early August) and Year 12 student number to apply for tertiary study through UAC. Once students have entered their contact details onto their online application they will receive a UAC application number. They will need this number and their UAC pin to make changes to their application, to check their ATAR and access their offers. It is important that students keep these numbers in a secure place.

The processing charge for on-time applications is **\$41**. Students who apply by the on-time closing date of 30th September will avoid higher processing charges.

I will hold a session with Year 12 on Thursday 18th August for students who need help with this process.

Schools Recommendation Schemes (SRS)

This is one way institutions make early offers of undergraduate admission to current Australian year 12 students using criteria other than (or in addition to) ATARS. These criteria include school recommendations, senior secondary studies and personal award and achievements. SRS applications have opened and will close on Friday 30th September. Information is available from Mrs Fry and booklets can also be downloaded from UAC.
