PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

As 2017 comes to an end, I would like to take this opportunity to thank everyone, including students, staff and parents for what has been an incredibly rewarding and enjoyable year at Asquith Boys High School.

2017 has been a wonderful year for Asquith Boys High School and for myself personally. Many of our 2017 successes have resulted from the incredible past work of our former Principal – Mr Terry Griffiths who ensured the establishment of exceptional learning opportunities for boys. I am determined to continue to build upon these strong foundations and firmly entrench Asquith Boys High School as the outstanding educational setting within this community.

We are very lucky to have an amazing Deputy Principal - Mr Andrew Skehan who is a tireless worker and crusader for all the staff and students of Asquith Boys High School. He has been incredibly generous with his time and commitment to ensuring that I have been exposed to all the traditions and ethos of this wonderful school. He too is a major contributor to the overall success of ABHS, and I personally thank him for his support this year.

57 years is a very long time, and over that time people and practices may change and evolve, but for traditions to remain and continue it requires the dedication and commitment of those who have the intimate corporate knowledge of Asquith Boys to ensure that they continue.

I would like to single out one major benefactor that we have at ABHS – Mr Chris Kent. Chris was one of the first cohorts of students to graduate from Asquith Boys High School. He went on to become a teacher in Visual Arts, and after a successful career as an educator returned to Asquith Boys High School as the Head Teacher CAPA. His connection with our school spans across the past 57 years and he still remains connected through his role of Asquith Boys High School Old Boys Coordinator and member of the School Council. I thank him for his unwavering commitment and passion for our school and am excited that he will be continuing in this role until 2020, which will be the schools 60th Anniversary. I would also like to take this opportunity to thank and acknowledge Rizwan Ali as School Council President for his work and commitment to the financial management of the school.

All of us at Asquith Boys are extremely grateful to be highly supported by a strong and dedicated executive staff, who are most importantly passionate about ensuring that we provide quality learning opportunities for our students. They are committed to the core business of educators, teaching and learning, and we will continue to work towards ensuring that this continues in 2018 through reflective and open educational practices.

In 2017 the English Faculty welcomed Ms Elly Connolly as the new Head Teacher. The faculty excelled with their incredible 2016 HSC results, debating successes with the Chinese Debaters reaching the NSW Quarter Finals, the reintroduction and leading of Peer Support, the quality of Year 7 PIP projects submitted and the appointment of Mr Tom Melrose to the English Staff. Our 2017 HSC English results were incredible with Advanced English again achieving above state by 0.28 and our Standard English results being an outstanding 7.37 above state averages.

Our Mathematics faculty also continued to excel in both HSC and NAPLAN results achieving well above state in both areas for a boys school and comparing extremely well against all schools. There was success with the introduction of the Maths Online program in Year 8 and the continuance of the Peer Tutoring afternoon sessions.

Mr Ross Johnston retired at the end of Term 3 and Mr Abraham Berakhi will be joining the Mathematics staff in 2018. Our Mathematics faculty continues to achieve highly commendable results, with Lucas Zheng achieving an incredible 98 for Extension 2 and 99 for Extension 1 Mathematics. Mathematics General 2 also achieved 3 Band 6 results and were an amazing 5.07 above state average.

This year we welcomed the total transformation of the Science labs into future focused dynamic learning classrooms that are the envy of many other schools. Mr Chris Yates received a transfer for 2018, however, his hard work and commitment with running the Duke of Edinburgh program at Asquith Boys High School will continue as a legacy, and is in the highly capable hands of Ms Connolly and Mr Murphy. We will be welcoming Ms Emily Schwabel to replace Mr Yates in 2018. Our Science HSC results were exceptional with a dramatic improvement in all Science subjects from their 2016 results, with Physics, Biology and Senior Science all an incredible 4.97, 4.82 and 4.15 respectively above the state averages. We are all excited to what they can achieve in the future with their amazing new teaching labs.

Our HSIE staff travelled to Europe for a Tour of the Battlefields as well as rewriting and programing their extensive number of Stage 6 syllabuses to continue their excellent results. Once again, HSIE courses were also well above state averages in Geography and Ancient History.

In the PDHPE Faculty we welcomed Mr Broome's appointment as permanent staff member of the PDHPE faculty in 2017. The Annual Ski Trip for the Year 10 Cohort was another highlight for the faculty and the boys, and so were their excellent HSC results, achieving 2.15 above state averages.

TAS have enjoyed implementing their new technologies in 2017 which included resources such as the laser cutter and 3D image printers which the students have greatly enjoyed integrating into their projects and designs in classes this year. I have loved experiencing our student's culinary creations when invited down to the kitchens; I often get caught with one fork in each hand inevitably digging into the fine foods they have prepared. We are pleased to note that Ms Bird has also been appointed as permanent member of the TAS faculty for 2018. As a faculty they achieved 2.76 above state in Software Design and Development, 3.35 in Hospitality VET and 0.94 in Engineering Studies - an excellent outcome for the staff and the students.

CAPA has been a dynamic faculty area in 2017 with the appointment of Mr Sam Newton as our permanent Music teacher and coordinator of the school band program with Asquith Girls High School. The bands have performed at numerous functions and ceremonies, with their participation in the Big Band Blast tour to Port Macquarie being one of the major highlights. Our Drama students were a success competing in a number of theatre sports and drama competitions. Ms Gowthorp who has been teaching Drama at Asquith Boys throughout the year, has been appointed to the school as our Drama teacher for 2018. Ms Mashman and Ms Hudson will be leaving to pursue other teaching opportunities and we wish them the very best in their new schools. Recently, we received notification that Peter Stevens had achieved a Band 6 and selection in ART EXPRESS with his Body of Work being shown in Griffiths and Taree.

Sport also continued their highly successful International Football tour travelling to New Zealand this year and heading to Hong Kong in 2018. Asquith Boys High also participated in our first interstate Rugby tour to Queensland where the boys excelled themselves. We entered an incredible 16 teams in the Zone Winter Sport competition and achieved the overall Rugby School Champions of the Zone in season 2017. We had regional Champion teams in AFL, Football and Cricket, and Ed Parker achieved International representation in Athletics.

Our terrific P&C body work tirelessly in all areas of the school to support your sons both in and out of the classroom. This year they have supported us with new pathways, shelter areas, blinds for the new science labs, school and educational programs, graduation ceremonies, and grounds maintenance, just to identify some of the many areas they assist us to make the learning environment exceptional for all of our students. Thank you to our P&C, especially the President Ms Tempe Beaven, for your work for the school in 2017.

Finally, I feel privileged to be Principal of Asquith Boys High School. My first year has been an incredible enjoyable, rewarding and enriching one, where I have gained and learned so much from everyone involved with this wonderful school. I thank you all students, staff and parents and the broader community for all the support that you have given to me in transitions to such an exceptional school, and it makes me excited to be working together in the future.

The most important part of this week was Presentation Evening. An evening where we get to acknowledge and reward our outstanding students who have consistently excelled throughout 2017 in their studies, leadership, citizenship, school service or sport. Again, I would like to extend my congratulations to all of the students who received awards, commending you for all that you achieved and setting the standards so high, and working to your very best in 2017. I eagerly look forward to seeing all that you can achieve in 2018. A big thank you to Ms Holder and Ms Cufre-Sadnick for their preparation and organisation of the evening with their team.

I would also like to thank our high calibre and hard working non-teaching staff. We are extremely lucky to have a group that is so talented and dedicated to the service of the students and staff at Asquith Boys High School.

As this year comes to an end, we are also farewelling Mr Sonter who has been the Asquith Boys High School General Assistant. He has elected to pursue other employment opportunities after extensive service of the school and all its facilities for 16 years. We wish him well with in his future endeavours.

ROYAL NATIONAL PARK QUALIFYING WALK BRONZE AWARD EXPEDITION

Between Friday 10th and Saturday 11th November, 16 students under the supervision of Mr Kitto and Mr Murphy, completed the challenging but picturesque walk through the Royal National Park from Bundeena to Otford. The boys showed independence and persistence as they navigated trains, buses and ferries, tackling headlands, beaches and forest while being completely self-sustained carrying all supplies and camping equipment.

Hopefully some of these fabulous cookies made it home to mum and dad!










IN THE KITCHEN continued....



Mr Robertson's Year 10 Science Class studied rockets as the context for the forces and motion topic. The boys put together some kit rockets and let them off near the bottom oval. They then assessed how their rockets performed and went about designing and making their own rocket from basic materials supplied by the teacher. Most of the rockets were launched successfully although one went sideways, another got stuck up a tree whilst the biggest rocket only made it a few metres in the air as it was too heavy.

This was a great end to the year and a great lead into the HSC science courses for the boys.
























FACULTY NOTES

Important information for Year 12 leavers 2017

University Info Days

Find out what your options are after you get your results. If you've applied for university for 2018, you might be a bit nervous right now. Getting your results and making your final course decision can be tough.

Once upon a time, students had to wait weeks or months between receiving their results and being offered a place, but now the 'Powers That Be' have made some changes to dates and everything happens much quicker than it used to.

What does this mean for you?

If you're finishing Year 12 in 2017 and have applied for university, it means that you'll only have a little while to change your preferences once you've received your marks before the main round of offers.

This year, results are released on these dates, and the option to change your preferences in some states for the main round closes only a week or so afterwards.

Don't freak out – there are still ways to change your mind later on (and a number of uni students change degree paths during their degree – it's not unusual and you're never 'locked-in' to finishing anything) but it's a good idea to change your preferences as soon as you know what your results look like.

Why would you change your preferences?

- You got a better mark than you expected, and want to apply for a more competitive course
- Or, you didn't do as well as you'd hoped to, and want to change to a more realistic course
- Perhaps you've changed your mind in the time between applying and getting your results, and want to go down a different path
- A new (and more appealing) course has just become available. Or you recently found out about a course you didn't know existed
- Sometimes universities choose to cancel a course, and you may want to replace it

It's a big decision, but now you have more information (i.e. your results) it's wise to rethink your options.

To help you make the best choice, many universities hold special 'Change of Preference' sessions (sometimes they're called 'Info Days') where you can get one-on-one advice and find out about your options.

You'll also find lots of information about university preparation courses, extracurricular activities, accommodation services and alternative entry pathways.

We've put together a list of all the upcoming Change of Preference Sessions, so you can pop them in your diary today.

- If you're planning to study at university or TAFE when you leave school, it's quite likely you'll need to be working as well. Even if you are financially supported in other ways, it's a great idea to get a job.
- Why having a job is great:
- You can pay your bills
- · You will gain a sense of financial independence
- · You'll learn new skills and gain experience that will be useful in future jobs
- You could make new friends
- It's important for resume-building

It can be tricky to find your first job, or find a job in a new city if you move to study. Here are a couple of tips on finding a job:

- Refresh your resume, and make sure you include all relevant experience. You'll be able to get help
 from your school careers adviser. There is also plenty of advice online about making your resume the
 best it can be.
- Always include a cover letter. This is a great chance to demonstrate your passion, tell them about some of your personal qualities, and include any extra details that aren't in your resume.
- **Get one or two people to agree to be a referee**. These should be people who will speak highly of you they might be a previous employer, a sports coach, a family you've babysat for, or a teacher.
- Apply for HEAPS of jobs. It can be hard finding your first job. Apply for every job you can find online
 that you'd be able to do and get to. If you don't know where to look, check out Seek. You should
 also think about all the food and clothing shops you go to and check out the Careers section on their
 websites.
- Make sure you tailor your application to each job. That being said, you can use a lot of the same information between different cover letters. Just make sure you include something specific to each role or brand.
- Find out whether your university hires any students on campus. Some of them have programs for students to work in the library or on-campus food stores.
