

PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

What a terrific way to commence the new school year, with the completion of our new Futsal / Volleyball court. It was so exciting to have it ready for the students on their first day back at school. The court is already receiving rave reviews from the students and extensive use in PDHPE lessons. Thank you to all the families who, through payment of their school contribution fees, contributed to the construction of this new multipurpose court to replace the dilapidated basketball

court. With the new path, multipurpose court and the soon to be completed garden by the Horticulture class, all in time for the Asquith Boys High School Open Night, I am sure you agree that the entry area to our school is looking much improved, far more appealing and practical for students, staff and the broader community.

High Achievers Assembly

It was pleasing to see so many of the successful 2018 HSC students at our High Achievers Assembly held the first week back at school, allowing the school the opportunity to acknowledge and recognise them for their achievements. The 2018 Dux was John Taylor-Booth with an ATAR of 92.55. John achieved Band 6 results in Ancient History, Mathematics and narrowly missed out on a Band 6 in Standard English where he achieved a very impressive 89. John excelled throughout the year in all courses and has put his success down to dedication and consistent hard work.

Asquith Boys High School also achieved 14 HSC Distinguished Achievers with Band 6 results across 5 different subject areas. 100% of our Advanced English and Extension Mathematics students achieved the equivalent of Band 4 or higher results. Asquith Boys High School students excelled in achieving a perfect 100% of the cohort above Band 4 in Visual Arts and Chinese and Literature, with 70% achieved in Chemistry, Society and Culture, Construction and Music courses.

Welcome to New Staff to Asquith Boys High School

Thank you to Graeme Carroll for attending the carnival and watching the 17 yrs+ 100m Freestyle race. Graeme still holds the oldest record in the ABHS Swimming program from 1978 for this event. It was a pleasure to have him return to Asquith Boys High School and share his time with our



current students. A shame that this record could not be broken this year. Who knows, maybe in 2020!

Congratulations to:

- C Miller, J Camp and R Brooks of Asquith Boys High School for being members of the successful Northern Districts 16 years Green Shield Sydney Grade Cricket competition. This team also went on to win the NSW State Challenge.
- E Parker won 1 gold in the 100m and 2 silver medals in the 200m and 100m events at the NSW State Age Athletics Championships. He also finished 4th in the Open Mens 400m hurdles.

Year 12 - I remind you that there are 26 school weeks left for you to maximise your opportunities and every lesson counts. Free periods are all study periods and it is an expectation that you will sign in at the library and engage in meaningful study and/or homework. NOGO - Students who are out of uniform or late to school without reasonable reason 3 or more times in 4 weeks will be placed on the NOGO list for two Wednesdays during Sport. This starts at 12.20 and concludes at 3.05pm. Being on NOGO means that you cannot participate in sport or recreational activities that are a part of school culture. These must be completed to be removed from the list. This also includes the Annual Ski Trip. Year 10 have been reminded regularly of the need to make positive choices and demonstrate reliability and integrity so that their ability to attend in 2019 is not jeopardised.

On a very exciting note our **Merit System** has undergone a positive change with merits being awarded digitally and a system under development which will allow us to notify parents each Friday afternoon of the merits their son has achieved during the school week. Stay Tuned.

While we will carefully consider all requests, please keep in mind, that many of our school services are utilised by more than one school and are often linked with normal route services either before or after the school run operates. This means that some changes may not be possible in the short term, but will be considered as part of future network reviews.

SCHOOL BUS INFORMATION GUIDE

FOR SCHOOLS

While you teach our future generations, we strive to transport them safely, comfortably and efficiently to and from school each year. This information guide gives you everything you need to know about our services and how to get assistance when you need it.





SCHOOL STUDENT TRANSPORT SCHEME

Transdev NSW supplies your school with school bus services for eligible students. Parents or students over 16 years of age must apply for a **School Opal or Child Opal card** from www.opal.com.au before starting school. Please note that Transdev NSW has no involvement in this process.

THE IMPORTANCE OF TAPPING ON AND OFF - WHY DO STUDENTS NEED TO?

It's essential for all school students to travel with a valid **School Opal Card or Child Opal Card** so that we can understand customer travel patterns and can adjust the services provided if necessary.

Every time a student TAPS ON and OFF, they are counted on our service - when they don't, they are invisible.

Transport for NSW watch our school service patronage closely to monitor the need for services and those seen with low patronage may be withdrawn.

Together with our drivers, Customer Experience Ambassadors and other Transdev NSW staff, we ask that you and your staff assist in encouraging students to have their Opal cards ready and **TAP ON and OFF** every single time they board our services.

The better data we have, the better we can service your school adequately. This is especially true if you believe you have capacity issues with your current services.

Please also see our 'Code of Conduct' document for students on buses, published by Transport for NSW.

WHAT CAN SCHOOLS DO TO HELP?

We have seen improvements at some schools where (staff onsite) use priority boarding to encourage students to have their Opal cards ready when boarding.

This involves getting those students with a **School Opal card** to board first, followed by **Child Opal** and finally those without a card.

Those without a card should be asked to provide a reason why they don't have one and given a reminder to get one for next time.

Please note that our drivers are expected to ask students to TAP ON and OFF as part of their duties.

We will also be conducting random visits to schools to reinforce this message to students.

Schools can also reinforce the importance of **TAPPING ON and OFF** through your school newsletters, assemblies and orientation days each year.

We believe that a consistent and unified message from both our drivers, staff and schools will help to change the student behaviour.

We were sad to farewell Mr Mark Miles in Term 4 last year. He has taken a full time teaching post up on the Central Coast – the Mathematics Department wishes him all the very best. It was a pleasure working with him. We would like to take this opportunity to **welcome as full time teachers** to the Mathematics faculty, Mr Jeffrey Smith and Mr Bradley Kemister. We would also like to welcome Ms Achala Piyasiri, who is relieving for the year. All three teachers have fitted in well to the Mathematics Faculty.

In 2018, the Mathematics Faculty had a very successful HSC campaign. Congratulations to Ms Laffer and Mr French for their classes' excellent results. Both teachers work tirelessly to provide the students with the best possible way to achieve their best – big thankyou to both teachers. Your effort is much appreciated!

Ms Laffer: **Mathematics General 2** - Five of her students achieved Band 6's, Six students achieved Band 5's. Overall, there were 13 Band 5's and 14 Band 4's in the Mathematics General 2 Course. Asquith Boys High School was 5.99 above State Average. Congratulations to Ms Laffer.

We would also like to acknowledge and congratulate John Taylor-Booth for scoring the highest HSC Examination result of 98%. John deserves all of the accolades he has received as he is such a conscientious student.

Mr French: **Mathematics 2 Unit** - All students achieved Band 4 or better. Four Band 6's, Two Band 5's and Four Band 4's. Asquith Boys High School was 7.76 above State Average. Congratulations once again to Mr French.

The Mathematics Faculty would also like to acknowledge and congratulate Ziqing (Alex) Zhu of Year 11, who chose to sit the Mathematics 2 Unit HSC Examination one year earlier. He scored the highest HSC Examination result of all our students in the Mathematics 2 Unit Course: 96%. Band 6 - a highly commended achievement from a hard working and very smart mathematician.

In total, Mathematics 2 Unit: 7 Band 6's. (including 2 Notional Band 6's) Asquith Boys High School was 7.76 above State Average.

Ms Laffer: **Mathematics Extension 1** - Four Band E3's (equivalent to Band 5's). Asquith Boys High School was 5.56 above State Average.

Other commendable results:

Mathematics Extension 2 - Guangqin (Harry) Wang achieved E3 (equivalent to a Band 5) Notional Band 6 in Mathematics 2 Unit (Mr French's class) - Zhewang (Dell) Tantai Congratulations to our hard working students for these outstanding results!!

School is back in full swing in 2019.

Maths Peer Tutoring runs Monday and Thursday after school from 3.05 to 4pm in Room 10. Afternoon tea is provided. Thank you to all the peer tutors who give up their time. A special thanks to Harrison Vo of Year 12, who is backing up for his 4th year of peer tutoring – an inspirational effort. A big thank you to Ms. Christodoulou and the Mathematics Staff for their continued involvement in the tutoring sessions.

So far, they have been writing some beautiful extracts which they will be developing into more extended stories, and we look forward to being able to publish some of these later this year.






So, we encourage all students, from Years 7-12, to find a book they are interested in, and to read regularly and widely, just a little each day.
















13 Suggestions to Try to Remove Acrylic Paint from Clothing

NOTE – at no point should you launder in warm or hot water or tumble dry or iron the stain – the paint sets forever.

Suggestion 1 – Spray area with Preen & put into bucket of COLD water & Napisan. Every couple of days scrub, spray with more Preen and put back into the bucket. Repeat process until gone.

Suggestion 2 - Use hairspray. Simply spray the area and rub it together. If it doesn't come out, don't despair, simply SPRAY some more and rub again. Repeat until it is gone!

Suggestion 3 - Laundry Detergent, Hairspray, Rubbing Alcohol, Lime Juice and Stain remover. Combine the hairspray, alcohol, lime and stain remover and scrub it with a scrubbing brush. It should start coming off. Rinse and repeat. Then when it is light enough, use stain remover and now, you should be able to only barely see it unless you look extremely close.

Suggestion 4 – Use sunlight soap – remove any raised paint. Really work the soap into the stain then rub together and/or scrub in with a toothbrush. Then leave in a bucket to soak in cold water for a week. Then repeat the process till it is gone. This took about 4 weeks but got it all out.

Suggestion 5 - Put it into the wash with soap and empty a can of coke (coca cola) into it as well!

Suggestion 6 - Hand sanitizer and dried in paint. Put it on and rub and rinse in cold water. This may take several goes. It also cleans paint from paint brushes.

Suggestion 7 - Nail polish remover. The kind NOT made for artificial nails is stronger. Sometimes rubbing alcohol works, but try the fingernail polish remover. Just dab some on with a cotton ball, wait about 5 min, then keep dabbing with a paper towel. You might also try an old toothbrush to get into the nap. Afterwards, pour on some liquid laundry soap then wash in the machine in warm or cold water. (not hot!) You may have to repeat this 2 or 3 times. DO NOT put any stain in the dryer or iron. The heat will "set" the stain! If this doesn't work, try the other type of fingernail polish remover (made for artificial nails) OR, they also make a paint remover for clothes. it's sold in craft stores, fabric stores & some home stores.

Suggestion 8 - Apply white spirits to a clean white cloth and rub the area free of paint. Launder as usual once the paint has been removed.

Suggestion 9 - Spray the stained area with WD-40 and allow it to sit for at least 1 minute. Rub the area with a clean, dry cloth until the stain is gone, and launder as usual.

Suggestion 10 - Spray the paint stain with Windex and scrub the area gently with a soft, clean cloth before laundering.

Suggestion 11 - A Home Remedy - to make the home remedy you will need to mix 2 tablespoons of ammonia, 2 tablespoons of white vinegar, and 1 tablespoon of salt together in a bowl.

- Step 1 If the paint is extremely thick in some spots you can take the toothbrush, dip it in the solution you made and start scrubbing. This should start to wear off the paint that is on the clothes. When no more paint will come off the clothes using the toothbrush you can mix up more of the home remedy, about 2 times what you made before.
- Step 2 Plug your sink and fill it with water. Add the solution to the water and stir it around a little bit. Submerge the clothes in the water and let them soak overnight. When you wake up the next morning the paint should be gone. If not go back at it with the toothbrush and then put it back in the sink to soak again. Repeat this step as many times as it may take to get the paint out. Most times it will only take one soaking to get rid of the paint.

Suggestion 12 – Nifty Spray - spray, rub with a cloth and together, rinse. Keep going till gone.

Suggestion 13 – White Spirit (dry cleaning fluid) – pick off dry paint where possible then rub with the white spirit until the stain is gone. This may take several goes.


