


Another part must be the wise use of the freedom of choice and the freedom of action to which we all lay claim. These must not infringe upon our neighbour's liberty, lest freedom for one may lead to repression for another.

Finally with this increased freedom we must all accept responsibility for our actions and our decisions - a real sign of maturity.

I would like to comment on what has been most important in my school life and should continue to be in the years to come. This is the realisation that there is a God who can be personally known.



And lonely sad humanity;



This year's Music and Drama Evening provided a large and enthusiastic audience with excellent entertainment, resulting from a most ambitious programme.

Four scenes from "Noah" by André Obey were interspersed with musical items of fine variety: a piano sonata by Jeff Melvaine, the junior choir singing negro spirituals, a trumpet solo by Peter Snitch accompanied by Allan Murchie, and performances by a brass quintet, the school band and the Cadet Drummers.

THE SCHOOL CADET UNIT


Thus at the beginning of 1970 the unit had a full complement of officers and NCOs. The unit's strength at this time was 83 men. Our first activity was a Range Day in early March. Following this, the unit took part in the Hornsby R.S.L. Anzac Day Ceremony at the Hornsby Cenitaph, on Saturday the 18th of April. Our annual Cadet Camp at Singleton took place, with the absence of Lt. Miller, between May 7 and 16. Following the camp

Asquith celebrated a further "first". In the four days after the camp, two NCOs, Keith Churchland and Darryl Freeman, took part in an "Adventure Training Course".

As a result, the unit gained its first two Adventure Training Badges. After resuming school, the Cadets held another Range Day in mid July at which the First Year cadets were drilled in firing from the 200yd mark. The Grand Finale to the year was the unit's Annual Ceremonial Parade, held on Oct. 8. On this occasion, only our second, Col. Davies was the reviewing officer, with Major Bohle M.B.E. and the Principal, Mr Bowles, accompanying him.

As this is my final year with the unit, I wish to thank my four Senior Officers: Capt Gerrard and Lts. Miller Donnelly and Saunders, as well as my contemporaries - Mr Warner and Mr Lovegrove.






Our Debating teams in the Hume

Hume Barbour: (L. to R.) Graham Barker Phillip Bonser, Mr J Gerrard, Malcolm George and Chris Priday.



School libraries throughout the state vary in size, convenience and equipment, Asquith's position is well above average on all three scores. We are well behind the modern Resource Centre libraries at present being built in twenty - seven lucky High Schools under the Commonwealth Grant plan, but let's hope we share their joy in the not too distant future. This year almost 2,000 books have been added to our collection. We subscribe to societies who keep us in touch with current developments in fields such as Economics, History, English, Geography and Science; magazine/periodical subscriptions are also indeed generous. Most students satisfy their research needs, few are disappointed through lack of information being available and gaps as they are recognised are filled as quickly as possible. Until Hornsby Shire Council Library becomes a working proposition for students, a heavy load is thrown onto the School Libraries in the district. As Librarian I would like to sincerely praise the work of Mrs Brennan, the Assistant Librarian, who has the new dictionary catalogue well advanced. I do hope pupils appreciate her effort beyond the line of duty.

The photo-copying machine been popular and the overhead projector quite valuable but the Audio-Visual booth and tape recorder, more recently acquired, mark the beginning of the library as an Educational Resource Centre. More and more is becoming known about the learning processes of the individual and the future as I see it calls for departmental teacher, librarian and student co-operation in the promotion of this exciting prospect. We strive to solve the complexity of the modern build-up of knowledge; there are difficulties when students vary as they do in pace of learning and receptivity. The multisensory approach should help provide



the educational quality we strive for. Of course two sets of earphones between one thousand boys is just a beginning; further equipment must be forthcoming to establish a solid media programme. However, there is value implicit in this initial selection of material: the audio - tapes, record discs, film slides, cassettes, radio programmes have been selected carefully and staff will, I am sure, enthusiastically add to it to achieve their desired educational goals. We are anticipating during 1971, the arrival of a student language laboratory and a video tape television monitor. Students will then have a permanent supply of valuable television programmes, thus relieving the school of a difficult time-tabling problem which exists at the moment.

The Library constitutes a distinctive but far from exclusive element in the tuition system of the school. Facilities, appropriate to our technological age, are available and with co-operation from all, we hope to develop their application to the best possible advantage for the students.

sincerely mothers and friends.


I could not let this opportunity pass without thanking the mothers and grandmothers of ex-students who are still coming along and enjoying their Canteen days.


Then towards the end of the year




ATHLETICS




Perhaps the best performance we have seen at school level or at Zone








BASEBALL: OPEN FIRST GRADE






Although the Open Grade Water Polo team did not succeed in gaining a place in the semi-finals, the results of their matches were very close, most of them being lost by a one goal margin.


TEN PIN BOWLING

way through the competition. Illness obliged Asquith to field a team of only eight players yet despite this disadvantage the team played with such skill and determination that they came out winners.








The team members have been good ambassadors for the school with their good manners on and off the courts, and with their correct attire at both competition and practice matches.
