## INTRODUCING 10TH ABHS PRINCIPAL BRYCE GRANT

#### An Interview with Bryce Grant

Bryce applied for the position of School Principal, in response to the advertised vacancy, following the retirement of Terry Griffiths, late 2016. Being the successful applicant, Bryce was appointed the 10th Principal of Asquith Boys High School in January this year. Bryce agreed to an interview for ABHS Old Boys.

Good morning Bryce. Can you recall any one experience from you childhood or youth that helped you on the path to become a teacher?

I do remember my first High School PE teacher. He was Stephen Knight a dual international for rugby union and league, who was still playing league for Manly at the time. Mr. Knight was a large, muscular, individual who sparked an interest in me to consider PE teaching as a career. This career was ideally suited to me as I love all sports and have a passion for healthy lifestyles.



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I also had a number of other inspiring and engaging teachers throughout my high school years. I was determined to emulate them as a teacher. I regarded them as quality human beings. *(continued on p 4)* 

## WORLD'S GREATEST SHAVE

In March, Asquith Boys High School took part in the World's Greatest Shave. The Leukaemia Foundations World's Greatest Shave is a charity that raises awareness and funds for people battling blood cancer. It encourages people to shave or dye their hair to show their support for the cause and help educate others on the experiences faced by people diagnosed with leukaemia.

A group of 20 boys from years 7-12, including Prefects and SRC members, shaved their heads on the quadrangle in front of a crowd of supporting peers. The boys bravely demonstrated their support for people with blood cancer. Together they ran the most successful World's Greatest Shave campaign the school has ever seen, collectively raising over \$4500 including the Mufti Day gold coin donation.



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## EDITORIAL

Asquith BHS Old Boys thanks retiring principal, Terry Griffiths for his strong support, of the ABHS Old Boys Club, which commenced during the first year of his Principalship at the Asquith Boys high School.

An indication of his commitment to the service to public education and to students and staff of Asquith Boys High School is witnessed by his eleven year tenure. Principals choose to stay where they feel most welcome and know they can make their best contribution to youth development. Terry travelled across Sydney for hours each day to fulfill his role. Terry's achievement ranks him as the longest serving principal. The previous tenures of Austen Hughes (1976 – 1985) and Chris Bonnor (1991 – 2000) each of 10 years were the School's greatest.

We wish Terry well with his plans for further community involvement and travel in the years ahead.

Readers may recall the account of talented young ABHS athletes breaking several long-standing School Athletics records, in last year's Old Boys Newsletter. As this talented group of athletes move through the School they continue to leave a trail of broken records.

Lawrence Frederick managed to set 4 records on the School Athletics Day 2017. Firstly Lawrence broke the School's longest standing record. Robb Hirst's 1964 15 Yr Long Jump of 6.02m, is now superseded by Lawrence's jump of 6.09m. In the 15 Years High Jump Lawrence jumped a height of 1.76m, beating M. Lawler's 37 year old record by 1cm. Lawrence then went on to smash Stan Kohlhardt's 42 year old record in the 15 Years Triple Jump, beating the old record by 25cm, hopping, skipping and jumping to a length of 12.65cm. Lawrence's final record was in the 15 Years 100m Hurdles, where he smashed Jackson Tuynman's more recent 2015 record by nearly 1.5 seconds, hurdling in a time of 14.31 seconds.

Jackson Tuynman set his own record on the day in the 17 Years Triple Jump, where he beat the old record by a whopping 31 cm, jumping a length of 12.90m.

Lawrence's brother, Harry Frederick just edged out Ross Lamb's 40-year-old record in the 17 Years 100m sprint, where he ran a time of 11.44s; beating the 1977 record by just .6 of a second.

Congratulations to the new record holders and to the former students who held those respective records for many decades.

A report on the Schools Swimming Record foreshadowed in last year's Old Boys Newsletter is still in preparation. In the meantime it can be reported there were no school records broken in the water since 2016.

Last Saturday night I had enjoyed participation in the School's Annual Trivia Night held in the School Hall. I particularly enjoyed meeting current Principal, Bryce Grant's family and renewing friendship with immediate former Principal, Terry Griffiths. We shared a table at this event.

Can we arrange some Old Boy tables for this event in 2018? If you are a prospective participant in Trivia Night, contact your Editor to go on the list of invites when that date is decided for this event next year.

The School's 60th Anniversary will be celebrated in 2020. It is not too early to give consideration to particular events and souvenirs appropriate to this occasion. Please send in your suggestions, for a new range of ABHS souvenirs in particular as the current range is quite depleted.

#### An Interview with Bryce Grant (continued from p1)

#### What are the main stepping-stones that led you to your position of Principal of ABHS?

After graduating my teaching skills were cultivated with three years teaching PDHPE at Granville South High School. A promotion followed, to the position of Head Teacher - PDHPE at Epping Boys High School. Fifteen years further on, I was appointed to the position of Deputy Principal at Muirfield High School. Following six years under the expert mentoring in educational leadership by Principal Jennifer Reeves, I was extremely fortunate to become the Principal at Asquith Boys High School.

Do you have inspirational models, either from personal experience or your reading that has inspired your work as an educator?

I have been very lucky to work with some very fine and inspiring mentors over the years, especially at Epping Boys and Muirfield High Schools. Many teachers in various faculties generously shared their experience and expertise. This enabled me to grow as an educational leader. I am indebted to all those who assisted me on path to becoming the Principal at Asquith Boys High School.

## In your role as Principal, what do you find that gets the bulk of your available time? How would you like to change that if you could?

As Principal there is an extensive amount of administrative work that is required to ensure the daily running of a high school facility. I would love to invest that time back into nurturing and mentoring all my staff on their educational journeys, by viewing their classroom work. More importantly this would provide more opportunity to see how the boys are engaging with their learning.

What do you view as your most important contribution to the daily operations of your school?

A genuine desire to improve the educational opportunities and well-being of all our boys.

Is there anything you find particularly endearing about the students of ABHS?

I am highly impressed by the student's and their polite and friendly demeanour. The other factor that impresses me is their ability to deal with the challenges that come their way. Current challenges include the complete refurbishment of four Science Labs and concurrent redevelopment of a large play area. These improvements have short-term implications for the School Timetable, as do sudden changes in weather. Asquith boys impress me with their ability to manage these situations and others as they arise.

What are the qualities of the staff you work with that you admire most?

The qualities of staff at Asquith Boys High School that I most admire are how they constantly strive to engage all boys in their learning. Their commitment to boys' education, and incredible ability to make the ordinary appear extraordinary, is astounding.

I understand your current role, as Principal of ABHS is you first position as Principal. How has this position lived/not lived up to your expectation of the role?

The position truly exceeded my expectations. The students, staff and the local community have been amazing at finding the time to ensure that I have been able to integrate with the traditions and ethos of Asquith Boys High School. I have been made very welcome. I look forward to a long and productive relationship with everyone involved with Asquith Boys High School. Together we offer exceptional learning opportunities for boys.

## HIGH HSC ACHIEVERS ASSEMBLY

Fifty years ago Alan Hayes was among the first group of students to graduate with a New South Wales HSC.

Alan has since received an Order of Australia medal in 2009, for his service to the community and to the environment as an author. Alan has perused his interest in herbal lore and natural alternatives for many years. He has created a self-sufficient and sustainable lifestyle with his wife on a small farm in a beautiful rural valley behind the Central Coast of NSW, Australia. Alan grows his own vegetables and fruit, recycles all sorts of material, and makes his own household products, from natural materials that are as effective as the harsher chemicals in commercial products. His home is carbon-neutral and is heated or cooled by the sun passing across the sky. All his energy needs are produced on-site and he lives the lifestyle that he encourages other people to try.

Alan's interest in herbs first began as a teenager. He became aware through his grandmother, of the herbal lore that had been passed down through his generations of his family. Now widely known to Australians through his *'It's So Natural'* writings, it is his knack of adapting the wisdom of the ages into solutions for the problems of the twenty-first century.

This led him to write a weekly newspaper column of environmentally friendly hints, tips and remedies for home, health and garden. The column *'It's So Natural'* is published in more than 300 newspapers and magazines Australia wide, in New Zealand, the United Kingdom, Ireland, Canada and the United States of America. Alan is recognised as one of the foremost exponents of the natural lifestyle. He has published more than three-dozen books on herbs, health, natural alternatives and sustainable living, and his wide range of best-selling books shares his down-to-earth and practical knowledge about natural living. He is committed to recycling, healthy living and utilizing natural resources. Alan's philosophy works three ways: do-it-yourself, save the planet, and save money.

Alan is now recognised internationally as the best-known exponent of the natural life. He has appeared regularly on a number of high rating national television programs as their natural alternatives expert. He speaks on, and demonstrates, the versatility of herbs for natural products. Thirty-four years ago he sold his successful advertising company to pursue a career as a full-time author and writer. Today he continues to write books and owns a number of independent newspapers throughout Australia.



When addressing the School's HSC Awards Assembly in February, Alan spoke about his life, successes, and the benefit he gained from two of his teachers when he was a student of Asquith Boys High in the mid 1960s. He gave the address to assembled students, staff, HSC award recipients and their parents in the School Hall.

'Two teachers in particular helped me to see what could become of the future. One of those teachers, John Gerrar, taught English. I was fortunate enough to have him for more than one year. He took an interest in what I was doing and became a mentor. He went beyond just teaching the normal English curriculum he would give me extra themes to write about, read my writing and tell me what I was doing right and what I was doing wrong. After I left School we became very good friends. Although my first book wasn't published till 1989, I would still see him and speak to him about writing. He said Alan; you have a way with words you need to use those words to make your way in life. Initially I would send off my writing to places like magazines, hopefully to get it published. It was difficult to earn a living, writing, because magazines didn't want to pay too much for a story, but it kept me moving forward.

Another teacher who I had a lot of respect for, although he wasn't directing me in the path of writing, was Ray Kench. Again I was fortunate to have him as my teacher for more than one year. He taught me Geography and Economics, but above all else he taught me the value of a positive mental attitude. The importance in believing in yourself, reaching for the stars, and believing if you want something badly enough you can do it.

Mr Kench helped me to formulate goals to help me move towards what I wanted to attain in the future.

It's all right for one to think well, here I am at School, I will become a writer, a doctor, a journalist or an accountant, it doesn't matter what you want to do, you need to work towards achieving that goal. He showed me how to make those goals achievable. By planning ahead, identifying what I wanted to achieve by five years' time. What do I want to be in three years' time? Rather than just leaving that goal sitting there and me not achieving anything, he showed me how to do it by breaking it down into its component parts. Think about what you need to achieve each year, then each month, then each week and then each day. All of a sudden what you have to achieve each day is not much at all. By being disciplined and applying yourself, that goal can be achieved in a very short time; way before you thought you could achieve it. Ray Kench also explained the process of evaluating your progress and adjusting your goals. I've done this all my life, and I thank Ray Kench for taking that time to help me see the value in this process. He was a great role model as he was involved with other things like sport and things outside of school like the surf club. He became a very strong mentor.

The encouragement that I received from these two teachers and their friendship after school enabled me to keep moving down the path of becoming a writer. Even though after leaving school it was almost impossible to earn a living being a writer, as artists tend to starve most of their life. For me, writing is like being an artist. An artist uses a brush to create his vision. I see words as a brush going on to a canvas to make a picture to let others see what is my mind's eye. Eventually I found entry into the advertising industry and ended up owning my own advertising company. Both of these teachers helped me achieve what I have been able to achieve. Even though I knew what I wanted to do they helped me develop the confidence and skills I needed. In the advertising industry these tools are very important.

More recently I met another person away from School who helped me with further direction in life. I had by then, developed a desire to become self-sufficient and sustainable, to move out of the city to a small farming community. I did not intend becoming a full time farmer because I was still commercially orientated, but wanted to grow my own food, preserve some of that produce, to make a home sustainable. Independently, away from mainstream living. I found that I had to make a decision. Do I continue to do what I was doing or sell the advertising company and try a new goal to become a full time self-sufficient person. This person I met suggested I write a book about what you do. Rather than write a great Australian novel, which is what I dreamt about as a youngster, but to write about what I do.

I tried this for three years and found a small publisher in Shepparton in Victoria. This publishing company did not live up to my expectations so I decided to use the skills I had developed over the years, and remembering what people like Ray Kench had said about maintaining a positive mental attitude and believing that anything is attainable if you try and keep on trying. Soon I found myself appearing on TV, on some of the lifestyle programs, marketing the book. That was 43-books ago! I have found it possible to live some of my old dream. To establish myself as a full time author in this country! I've also taken advantage of opportunities as they present themselves as you go through life. This is another thing that Ray Kench taught me. You will find as you go through life opportunities will present themselves. What you do with those opportunities will make a difference. I've seen many people over the years that have had that opportunity and yet not taken the gamble of grasping it. Later they have regretted that lost opportunity. Not always in seizing the opportunities does it work. One might stumble; the worst thing that can happen then is that you land on the bones of your backside. Instead of crying about it if this happens, you pick yourself up, dust yourself off and try again. Most importantly, you analyse what it was that caused you not to succeed the first or second time. One of the greatest success stories in this regard is Sir Lesley Hooker who built the L.J. Hooker real estate empire. He stumbled four times before he found his feet, but each time he analysed what it was that caused him to fail. Finally he achieved success that he wanted to achieve.

It doesn't matter what you want to do in life. If you set your goals and remember to continue to re-evaluate your goals, considering advice from those around you, from your teachers and those in your family that you spend a lot of time with. Share your dreams and aspirations because you never know how it can turn into a fortunate outcome as it has in my case. It doesn't matter what you want to be in life, you need to set those goals. At the end of the day, success comes not from having a great pile of money in the bank, success is enjoying what you do, being able to wake up in the morning enjoying the challenges ahead but most important sharing that with people around you, your family, your future spouse, no matter who that might be, then you will have a rewarding life'.

## PRINCIPAL TERRY GRIFFITHS FAREWELLS ABHS

The 9<sup>th</sup> Principal farewelled the School at its 56<sup>th</sup> Annual Presentation Ceremony (formerly 'Award Night' or 'Speech Night'), in December 2016. In his Principal's Address, Terry identified some of the many changes made under his Principalship.

Commencing with out of doors learning spaces; the School Oval Fitness Centre, Horticulture Garden, Alfresco Dining Deck and provision of hand ball courts for student play during break times on the renovated School Quad. Other outdoor improvements include the installation of the perimeter security fence, a School exterior repaint and installation of a Pedestrian Pathway entry to the School from the Pacific Highway.

Additional indoor improvements that support curriculum focused learning are the two industrial kitchens and the repurposing of a classroom into a Gymnasium. Planning for the complete renovation of all four Science Labs is in progress at the time of Terry's Farewell.

Curriculum development occurred in a number of Key Learning Areas, with the addition of Textile Design, Chinese Languages, Hospitality courses and Horticulture. Implementation of extra learning technologies such as the interactive white boards throughout the school enhances student learning.

With a focus on the cultural and social development of students, additional Leadership Training opportunities were introduced. Eleven more countries have been included in the Annual Football Tour Itinerary. ABHS students support residents living in high care in local Retirement Villages, participate in bush regeneration programs and maintain strong links and support for the Clark Road Special School. Asquith Boys High maintains its place as the highest earning School Sponsor of Legacy, in NSW.

The Student Scholarship program developed under Terry's leadership. Band Scholarships to provide instrument training expanded to include Scholarships in Visual Arts, and a Senior Student Two Year Scholarship in the name of the School's first Principal; Mervyn Brown.

Asquith Boys High students continue to perform better than most other comprehensive boys' secondary schools. HSC students are consistently among those receiving awards Mathematics Competitions, Art Express, In Tech and Encore, and as participants in Schools Spectacular.

A new maroon Senior Student Blazer was introduced in recent years, giving students extra recognition in the public arena. A few years ago an Asquith student was elected Premier, by his peers, in the NSW Youth Parliament.

Mr Griffiths reports his pride in the students of ABHS on all appropriate occasions. He regards the School as the best advertisement of a Public Education system that needs to be valued and well-funded; a fountain of our democracy. Terry believes public education in Australia to be the bedrock of our egalitarian society.

In finishing his Address, Terry paid testimony to the 'high calibre and hard work' of his School staff and their commitment to students, and congratulated all those who gained awards.

## **SURFING SCIENTIST**

A group of our best scientists in Years 7, 8 and 9 were exposed to some great science action and ideas from Ruben Meerman, the Surfing Scientist. As always Ruben brought along plenty of fresh demonstrations, as well as his renowned LASER and liquid nitrogen experiments.

Several of the new ideas he presented to the boys used their smartphones to enhance their knowledge and understanding of science, including high speed multi-frame cameras in the latest phones to analyse motion and using the in-built accelerometer (used for the screen rotation) for graphing motion, vectors and acceleration due to gravity. Ruben also used the compass app on the phone to detect magnetic fields resonating from a current carrying coil.

The boys were shown how digital cameras have a wider range of sensitivities than the human eye by detecting Infra-red rays from a remote control unit. There was a laser demonstration on how a dark balloon absorbed more energy than a light coloured balloon by popping a balloon inside another balloon.

Change of state and particle kinetic energy was shown by deflating a balloon with liquid nitrogen whist a cool trick of electrostatic repulsion was presented with a static charged balloon and some metallic tape.

Ruben was generous enough to stay behind for another hour to talk to the interested boys and share his knowledge. All the boys appreciated the cool nature of modern science and hopefully this will inspire some of the boys to pursue a career in science and technology.

## THE PASSING OF AUSTEN JAMES HUGHES, OAM PRINCIPAL OF ASQUITH BOYS 1976 – 1985

Austen was loved by students and staff in his role at Asquith Boys. His Principalship coincided with a period in the School's history when the student population was at its greatest, notwithstanding that during those years, less than 50% of students completed their HSC. With a population of above 1,100 students two demountable classrooms were installed to cope with demand. Managing the large number of students was one of Austen's challenges at ABHS.

Austen's love for students at that time was remarkable whom he referred to as 'my boys'. Likewise his love of cricket was widely recognised. During his entire time at Asquith Boys he held the position of President of the Northern District Cricket Club, until 2002. Two years prior to his retirement from teaching and Asquith Boys, he was elected a Life Member of the Northern District Cricket Club. In 1984 Austen's service was recognised with Life Membership of the NSW Cricket Association.

I then thought to myself, given how old I am (56 years) that Austen was probably long gone to another place as would many of my teachers, particularly from primary school.

I remember Austen going out to see as many games as possible on Sports day. He was a great Principal of the 'old school' buying the best equipment especially for sport. He was wise and caring of his staff and students too.


## Mrs Laine Saunders (Mrs. Jim) Special Ed teacher at ABHS from late 60s till late 70s. Laine is the late Jim Saunders (music teacher's) wife.

The vale for Austen Hughes made me reflect on ABHS times and I thought I would pen a memory. Mr. Hughes' first year as Principal in 1976 coincided with my last year as a student. At the end of the year, just before we broke up for HSC exams, I was summoned to the Principal's office. I went in trepidation, trying to think what had I done to warrant this meeting. To my surprise Austen asked me what my plans were after school, to which I replied that I planned to have a few months doing nothing much before I hoped to go to university. To my surprise he then offered me a job as the School Groundsman, full time for 6 weeks at the then princely sum of about \$300 a week. Before I could think I said yes, and so after exams I started as a casual employee, tending gardens and lawns. The main job was riding a tractor to mow the sports oval. I had never driven a tractor before and learned quickly. On wet days I was expected to work indoors, mending broken furniture, but it was summertime and I was always outdoors.

Working around the school and in the sheds, I had many curious looks from younger boys who thought they recognised me. I needed to buy fuel and parts for lawnmowers and the tractor, and asked Austen how should I organise this. He said that I could go to certain local suppliers where the school had accounts and that I could use his car to do this! It was a great feeling driving his Nissan sports car around Asquith/Hornsby several times to buy supplies, and watch boys incredulous looks as I left and returned to the school in the Principal's car and using his car space!

I am very grateful for the opportunity Austen gave me for an 'after school' job, and the trust he placed in me (and for the anonymous teacher who gave him my name). My memories of Austen in 1976 were good ones, as he led the school and gave privileges to Year 12 students (which we felt were duly earned).


A plan has been developed to revitalise the space on the ground floor of E Block by creating an ABHS Hall of Sports Champions.

ABHS students who gain School Sports Awards have gone on to sports representation at State and National level. Other students, participating in sports not available at School (such as archery, table tennis, ten pin or darts) have achieved recognition at the highest level of participation. Some former students of ABHS have not achieved high level sports participation until their post school years. Recognising the achievement of any former student who has achieved State or National representation will be the purpose of the ABHS Hall of Sports Champions. Achieving this will be of considerable benefit to current students and the School Community.

The plan for the Hall of ABHS Sports Champions has been outlined and accepted by the ABHS School Council and P&C. Some funding has been provided by the ABHS P&C resulting in the installation of an Honour Roll of students who achieved a NSW CHS Sporting Blue whilst at School (see photo). Last year former students of the 1964 graduating class raised \$230 at a Reunion Dinner towards the Hall of Sports Champions.

## **BRIAN'S EXPERIENCE WITH BULLYING**

As Editor of the ABHS Old Boys Newsletter, I recently received the note below, from former student Brian Gibson. Brian Graduated from ABHS in 1994. Brian has written to ABHS Old Boys on other occasions. In 2011 he set up a fan page on Facebook, Twitter and Youtube for fans Football in Australia. For this Brian achieved a 'Best Use of Social Media Award'. Brian has remained a strong supporter of ABHS, assisting the school with processing media for the 50th Anniversary in 2010.

"Hey everyone, My name is Brian Gibson. I wanted to use this time to tell you that no matter what happens in life, in my experience, it can get better.

Growing up I was a smart child and one of the youngest kids in my classes at school. I was one of the quietest and was regularly bullied by other kids. This led to tall poppy syndrome when I reached high school as the bullying became physical; I stopped trying in class and hung out with 'the cool kids' as a means of coping. My dad was unaware of why my grades were slipping, and as he had great hopes for me, pulled me out of soccer to focus on school... It didn't work.

Soon after school finished I realised that I'd no longer be an easy target by being a wallflower and grew a strong desire to make up for lost time and make a difference to people, businesses and my chosen sport - football.

Who would have thought I'd end up managing large technology teams early in my career, then later, after a sea-change, winning an award for 'Best Use of Social Media' (reported in Vol 14 O.B. Newsletter). Currently I work as a social media mentor for Football Federation Australia working with everyone from Caltex Socceroos and Hyundai A-League players through to state federations and A-League clubs.

It has been a great journey so far with highlights including being involved in the first live streamed events for sports in Australia on both Facebook and Twitter, covering four A-League Grand Finals, helping build the Western Sydney Wanderers FC and working with some of the highest profile athletes in Australian sport including Tim Cahill and Alessandro Del Piero."


## **SCIENCE HORTICULTURE NEWS**
