EDITORIAL

Two articles in this edition, contributed by former students, give a sports/fitness bias. These prompted my recollections of participation in PE classes and sport on Wednesday afternoons. In the early 60's the 'sports uniform', worn to School on Wednesdays was generic white. This is as far removed from the uniform featuring corporate colours of more recent decades, as is current sports footwear from Dunlop sandshoes.

As a First Year student in 1960 I recall an escapade one Wednesday afternoon, following 'House Tennis', at the local Coady Tennis Courts. My friend, Graeme and I returned to School intent on harvesting a crop of mulberries from a tree growing near a boundary fence near the present location of the School's Cricket Nets. Before the School oval and Cricket Nets were established this southern part of School Grounds was 'out of bounds', overgrown with tall weeds, as it had been some years since the horses and cattle referred to in the School Song, had grazed these parts.

Anyway, back to the mulberries. Graeme and I clambered around the branches collecting mulberries in our lunchboxes and some paper bags. On deciding we had as many as we could transport home, we headed to Hornsby station for the trip home. We hadn't walked far before we realised the paper bags were not going to support some of the overripe mulberries. White tee shirts served the purpose. When pulled out they formed a pouch that cradled the harvest till our destination was reached.

When I arrived home, my mother was furious about the large purple stain down the front of my shirt and shorts. The mulberries were great however, when cooked for dessert later in the week.

INTERNATIONAL FOOTBALL TOURS



I would like to begin by thanking all in the Asquith Boys High community who have supported the formation of the ABHS Old Boys Club, and the Old Boys Newsletters. Hopefully this initiative will contribute to maintaining some of the many memories and traditions that are embedded in the school's history. Tradition is a very important part of life at Asquith Boys. From school songs, to poetical debates, to

sporting events, these customary activities makeup some of my fondest recollections of my time at Asquith, as I am sure they do for many others. I would like to talk in some detail about my experiences with what is becoming a relatively novel tradition at ABHS, that is, the annual overseas football tours

Over the past five years, a very fortunate group of Asquith Boys students and staff have embarked on journeys all over the Asian-Pacific region to test themselves against some of the best footballers. As a senior student I was privileged enough to travel to New Zealand (2003) and Vanuatu (2004) as a part of the senior playing group under the guidance of Mr George Moscos, Mr Mike Blackwood and Mr Gavin Lister. In subsequent years, I gratefully accepted the opportunity to join Mr Moscos and Mr Blackwood en route to Fiji (2005), Malaysia (2006) and Thailand (2007) as part of the coaching staff

With insight into these tours from the position of both player and coach, I am endowed with a unique perspective on what these tours mean to Asquith Boys, from the point of view of student and former student. Most obviously they provide an opportunity to not only play football against foreign opposition, but for many of us to play against some of the best players we have ever seen, let alone played against. Over the years, the Invitational and Elite sides of Asquith Boys have played International (age limited) Teams from Vanuatu and Malaysia, as well as Representative and School Boy Champion teams from New Zealand, Fiji and Thailand. I am sure the now former Vanuatu National Coach Juan Carlos Buzzetti and his teams (including the said to be Southampton scouted "big bopper" forward) will forever live large in the minds of all who saw and played against them in 2004.

On a personal note, I believe there are perhaps more rewarding adventures and experiences to be had on these tours than playing football, namely, the opportunity of comradeship and exposure to different and diverse cultures. My mind is cast back to the inaugural tour of New Zealand when we travelled the south island; from Christchurch to the heavily Scottish influenced city of Dunedin and on to the adventure haven that is Queenstown. Each city providing not only a different experience of what it is like to live across the Tasman, but also a new opportunity to room with a different fellow Asquith Boy. The many hotels of New Zealand are warmly remembered, but it is hard to beat my personal favourite in the tour accommodation stakes. Situated on our own Island in Vanuatu, a short dinghy ride from the local school and training pitch, all 30 plus boys shared one large barracks style housing. The accommodation consisted of bunk beds, a communal kitchen and a backyard,




Charity Concert Event in support of the Royal Flying Doctor Service

This year Ben and Peter were among several 'Old Boys' who contributed to Performance Night.

Following their performance Ben, the vocalist in the partnership agreed to a short interview.

Interviewer: What benefit/enjoyment did you get from performing as a former student, at this Performance Night?

Ben: As a student I always looked forward to and enjoyed our School Variety Nights. They give performers and audience a chance to catch up with friends and enjoy live music. In addition performers have the opportunity to express themselves creatively. I had fun in this last concert, and used the night to promote my own music to the community. As a former student I felt privileged to be invited back to play.

Interviewer: What challenges, as a former student, did you meet in planning your participation in the Performance Night?

Ben: Organizing rehearsal times around work and Pete's study were the biggest challenges in planning our act for Variety Night. It certainly didn't help living on the Central Coast either, but we got there in the end.

Interviewer: How do you define your current musical style? Your style has evolved in recent years. Who were your main influences during this time?

Ben: I would define our genre as Australian country/folk music. In the past I have played rock, jazz and heavy metal. So by playing country music, immediately came contrast. I suppose I've grown up listening to country music. Artists like Johnny Cash, Rolf Harris and John Williamson to mention a few. I used to play this sort of music back in primary school where I won competitions. It was after I lost my wonderful Pop in 2002 that I began to change. Being very close to him, it made things harder. I began to conform to my peer group, playing heavier and more aggressive music.

One night when I remembered Pop's words; "Never give up that guitar Ben!" I then undertook a huge turn around by selling my drum kit in order to buy a new guitar. I soon got back into the swing of country music. The first country performance at school was the hardest. I didn't know what people would think. I'm so lucky I had such good mates and people around me that didn't care, they just enjoyed it, making every performance a pleasure.

Interviewer: I am interested to hear of your plans to continue your aural studies next year. What motivated your interest in this area Ben? What do you hope to get from this course?

Ben: I have always loved music and always will. I would love to perform music, professionally, for the rest of my life but naturally it's not realistic. I decided years ago that I wanted to do something in the field of sound. I am currently in the process of filling out an application to do a 2008 TAFE course in this area. The course is called Music- Technical Production. It's located at Ourimbah, which is about a 30-minute drive from home. I hope to further my knowledge by completing this course, which may assist me with a career in the industry as a live sound engineer.

Interviewer: Is there any particular anecdote/incident from your participation in the Performance Night that you would like to share?

Ben: Having played Cape York Peninsula many times at Asquith, I feel the need to mention how many times I forgot the lyrics in my final performance. I'm sorry about that. However I don't know what it was, but no one said anything about it. I couldn't believe it. Thank you. I really have enjoyed my time at Asquith and hope we can stay in touch.

AUSTRALIAN MATHEMATICS COMPETITION

There is a long tradition of students from Asquith Boys High School participating in the Australian Mathematics Competition with many of them receiving Credit, Distinction and High Distinction certificates over the years. This year the competition was held on 25th July and we had approximately 100 students competing. We decided to make participation compulsory for the enrichment class in Year 7 and for the top classes in each of Years 8 - 12, but other students were welcome to join.

Each year the Australian Mathematics Competition involves around 400,000 students from across the nation. The aims of the competition are:

- To highlight the importance of mathematics as a curriculum subject
- 2. To give students an opportunity to discover talent in mathematics
- 3. To provide resources for the classroom and general discussion

Competitors are asked to solve 30 problems in 75 minutes. The questions become progressively more difficult through the test and the final few questions will challenge even the most talented student of Mathematics. The nature of the problems tends to be quite different from the types of questions we tackle during normal Maths classes and some students find that they have a hidden talent for thinking through these problems.

To help our students prepare for the competition Mrs Laffer ran lunchtime lessons in the two weeks leading up to the competition. Students had the opportunity to work through problems from previous years and received general hints on how to approach problem solving.

Thanks to Mrs Laffer for both the lessons and for her organisation of the event.

DEVELOPING LITERACY AND NUMERACY AT ASQUITH BOYS

Parents of boys in Years 7 to 10 may have noticed, as part of the Year Advisor's section of their son's Half Yearly Report, a comment on either 'satisfactory' or 'unsatisfactory' participation in Literacy and Numeracy lessons. This comment is a reflection of each boy's participation in our cross curricula Literacy and Numeracy program, which has been running on Monday and Friday mornings since the start of this year.

The objective of the program is to firstly improve basic literacy and numeracy skills in our junior school, then use this as the basis to target more specific areas of concern, such as the quality of extended written responses across all subjects.

The origins of our literacy and numeracy program are drawn from a number of areas. Primarily, our annual analysis of ELLA and SNAP test results among our Year 7 & 8 students, School Certificate results for Year 10 students, and ultimately HSC results for boys completing Year 12. All of these results clearly show the need for constant reinforcement of all of those basic literacy skills which ultimately lead to perceptive and comprehensive reading, along with effective written responses. The same conclusions certainly apply to numeracy skills across a range of subjects.

The nature of all of these public examinations - no matter what the subject - place increasing emphasis on numeracy and more particularly literacy skills, in determining which students achieve the higher band examination results. Accordingly, teachers at Asquith Boys have been working in cross faculty teams over the past 18 months, taking advantage of regional and federal government funding, in order to produce literacy and numeracy lessons which are designed specifically for our boys, drawing on content from the subjects they are already familiar with, in order to improve their ability to achieve success in these examinations.
